

# Letter from our Chairperson

Hello.

It has been another year of trials and triumphs at Linkes. We have remained true to our commitment to tackling the impact of poverty and providing opportunities for learning and well-being on the estate and the surrounding community. We are proud of what we have achieved over the last year.

Emerging from the restrictions of lockdown, we were reminded again that meeting in person matters. As we struggled to repair and reopen our Community Rooms, we worked with local venues to relocate our **English classes** and creche to nearby Knightswood Community Centre. **Boogie Babies**, also based there, is thriving as preschoolers and their caregivers meet again for some much needed fun. The **Men's Group** were delighted to access their model railway in Knightswood Congregational Church. The **Women's Group** have unexpectedly thrived online. The **Seniors Lunch Club**, a stalwart service at Linkes, is back in full swing on site. Our **play work** has been steady and busy throughout the year, providing a safe space for children to laugh, learn and play together - all the more important in light of the challenges families are facing.

**Food** remains a focus on the estate, a sign of the times. Our committed volunteers in the Food Group have been progressing creative longer term solutions to providing good food on the estate and we look forward to working with Wheatley Homes in the coming year to establish a new Community Pantry on the estate. Our winter **Community Meal**, gave us a welcome taste of community events again, providing a hearty meal for 50 people.


Sadly, we've been responding to more people in crisis. With wider services being reduced, moving online or with long waiting times, we introduced a **weekly signposting session**, with an Arabic translator to bridge the gap locally as well as providing telephone support throughout the week. We will continue to look for solutions to emerging needs.

Throughout the last year, we have been constantly reminded that kindness is key and that a little kindness goes a long way in easing burdens, addressing crisis, and planning solutions. Our staff, board and volunteer team and our members have demonstrated great kindness to each other and that is evident in the warmth at Linkes and what we are achieving together. Our strapline for Linkes: 'All People, One Community' remains at our core.

My thanks go to everyone involved in the work this year: my fellow board members, our volunteers, sessional workers, staff, partners and funders.

# Scottish Charity Awards 2021



Run annually by the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO), the Scottish Charity Awards celebrate the best of Scotland's voluntary sector.

We were delighted that Robert Smith, chairperson of Linkes Community Project, has been recognised as the winner in the 'Trustee of the Year' category. His nomination tells of his impact in the local community over the last year:

'Robert Smith is the co-founder and driving force of Linkes community project (2006), serving as chairperson. He is a treasure and the best of Glasgow: open, canny, a born activist, warm neighbour, a community man through and through. He has dedicated the last three decades of his life to working and volunteering within the community." He has been an unstoppable force for good in response to Covid-19, generously and relentlessly building an inclusive community response to the pandemic and rising to every challenge thrown at him. Between March – September 2020, Robert's team of volunteers at Linkes delivered a whopping 18,000 meals to older/vulnerable people and 2,000 grocery packs to families. Since October 2020 Robert has overseen logistics of a weekly food-hub.

Robert makes the magic happen, whether he is running board meetings, bulk buying food, driving the van, supporting new volunteers or making friendly phone calls – he is an unstoppable force for good.'

In response to winning the award, Robert stated:

"I would like to thank the amazing team of staff, board and volunteers at Linkes, our partners and funders and everyone else in the community who contributes to what we do. I'm really proud of what we've achieved in what has been an extremely difficult year and on behalf of the team at Linkes, I'd like to say a big thank you for this award."

Over the year our food work has continued to grow.

Local volunteers contributed **429** hours across our Food Project, including our community meal, foodhub, food group and friendly phone calls.

**49** weekly food hubs distributing essential groceries to the local community. This was used by over **180** households.





24 local people attended one of our three Balcony Growing Workshops in June-July 2021, delivered in partnership with Propagate where participants learned how to grow herbs and vegetables in their own homes.

**240** referrals to the local Food Bank, supporting **39** households.


6 local people met 10 times as part of our Food Group, to consider key issues around food poverty on the estate and how best to address them.

**8** Local people, including our **2** volunteer cooks, received free REHIS Food Hygiene training with Clyde College as part of our Community Meal in March 2022.

25 adults and 25 children, along with 10 volunteers and staff, attended our Community Meal event on Saturday 26th March. The Community Meal aimed to bring local people together after the pandemic for a healthy meal to reduce isolation and connect with others in their local community.

I cannot thank you enough for your total support. I do realise there are many others struggling with the day to day situation but my life has just got that bit easier now after the help I recieved from you.







This year has been busier than ever with our community activities and group-work and it's been great to get back to meeting many of our groups face to face.

- 43 women participated in our weekly women's group via zoom and in person and 90 women participated in our What's app group.
- 32 members participated in our senior's lunch club (10 weeks of meal delivery, 14 weeks of afternoon tea and 19 weeks of freshly cooked three course lunches and much-loved bingo!)
- **32** students attended two accredited 32-week ESOL classes (beginners and elementary) delivered by Clyde College, with each class taking place for two mornings a week (one session online and one session in person).
- 13 women attended a 10-week course in IT and CV Building, delivered by Clyde College.
- **51** people were provided with IT support, including accessing digital devices and wifi, enabling them to join online classes/groups and access services.
- 9 men participated in our men's group, building a model railway and attending a Model Railway Exhibition at the SECC.

We supported local people with 65 enquiries through our drop in signposting sessions with an Arabic interpreter.



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It's great to have the lunch club open again. It's somewhere to go and I get to meet a lot of people and discuss how things are going. I absolutely love it.

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Across the year we worked with **547** children and young people to deliver a vibrant programme of acytivities.

#### **Term time programme:**

We delivered **204** sessions across **36** weeks:

6 Friday night Pump Track sessions with DRC Youth Project – Introducing children to BMX pump track riding.

14 BMX sessions: Girls on Track - empowering girls to become accredited to ride the Olympic standard BMX track and try out the Sir Chris Hoy Velodrome.





- **45** Lincoln Avenue Play weekly afterschool sessions for primary school children, giving them the chance to relax, refuel and play on their terms.
- **32** Kirkton Avenue Street Play giving children the chance to play on their street, in the way they want.
- **19** Youth Clubs zoom quizzes, social media chats, trips, a place to come and hang out with friends.
- **24** Bikeability sessions children learning how to navigate busy roads safely when out on their bikes.
- **30** School Play free play for school children, who set what they want to play during their lunch break.
- 22 Boogie Babies sessions from under 5s, attended by 55 families.

#### **Holiday Clubs**

We delivered **36** play sessions and trips across **9** weeks:

#### **Spring**

**25** activity packs and **60** fruit and veg bags distributed, feeding **165** children.



#### Summer

**57** children participated in our **23**-session summer programme. **128** fruit and veg bags were distributed, feeding **180** children.

We also delivered 9 exciting trips, including tree climbing, canoeing, cycling, hill walking.

#### October

- 30 children enjoyed trips to the Tall Ship, Riverside Museum, Sir Chris Hoy Velodrome & canoeing.
- **55** fruit and veg bags were distibuted, feeding **140** children.
